International Conference on Languages, Literature and Translation Studies:

Lessons from the past and challenges of the future 27–28 April 2023 University of Mons, Belgium

The late Raymond Renard (1925–2020), renowned linguist and committed humanist, was one of the founders of the verbo-tonal method of phonetic correction and of the structuro-global audiovisual method (SGAV), both of which flourished throughout Europe and beyond from the 1960s onwards. At a time when a growing number of international organisations were being set up, particularly in Belgium, itself a multilingual country, Renard, as head of the Institut des langues vivantes (Institute of Modern Languages) at the Polytechnic Faculty of Mons, foresaw the growing importance of the fields of translation and interpretation. In 1962, he founded the School of International Interpreters (EII – École d'Interprètes internationaux), the excellence of which he never ceased to defend. Helped by the relocation of SHAPE (headquarters of the NATO Allied Command Operations) to Mons in 1967 and by the gradual expansion of the EEC and later the EU, the EII continued to grow and prosper. In 2008, it was integrated into the University of Mons-Hainaut as an independent faculty – the EII was the first school of translation and interpretation to acquire this status in French-speaking Belgium. Raymond Renard was also instrumental in the later integration of the Faculty of Translation and Interpretation (FTI-EII) into what is now the University of Mons (UMONS), which was created in 2009 through the merger of several institutions of higher education. With its sixty-year history, the FTI-EII continues to receive international recognition and was awarded the European Union's "European Master's in Translation" label both in 2014 and in 2019.

Like the humanities and social sciences in general, the disciplines of Languages, Literature and Translation Studies (the official name of the thematic doctoral school ED3 at the Fund for Scientific Research F.R.S-FRNS) are now at a crossroads. The rise of artificial intelligence and big data as well as the increasingly complex international situation are changing and challenging the field, not only on the level of education and research (including in older disciplines such as comparative literature or translation criticism) but also on the professional level.

Now is therefore an excellent time to look back on the past and see what valuable lessons it can teach us for the present and the future of the relevant disciplines. To do this, the FTI-EII, on its 60th anniversary, invites you to its international Conference. Forty-six speakers from all over the world, as well as Christine Lombez (Nantes University), Anthony Pym (Universitat Rovira i Virgili) and Elisabet Tiselius (Stockholms Universitet), as keynote speakers, will aim at raising a number of fundamental questions to shape the future of our disciplines, while building on the achievements of the great theorists and practitioners of the past.

By plane

The two international airports nearest to Mons are Brussels Airport, the largest of Belgium, and Brussels-South Charleroi Airport. Brussels Airport is Belgium's major hub for all major destinations, including long-distance and transcontinental flights; Brussels-South Charleroi Airport, on the other hand, is mostly focused on low-fare flights from/to Europe and North Africa.

To go to Mons from Brussels Airport, you can take a direct train from Brussels-Airport-Zaventem station towards Mons. The average journey time is 1h30.

Important note! As the airport is based in the Dutch-speaking region of the country, you will probably need to look for the train to <u>Bergen</u>, the Dutch name of the city.

There is one direct train per hour from the airport towards Mons. If you are not able to get it, you can also ride up to Brussels first (at least four trains per hour), and then change trains. If you depart from Brussels-South Charleroi Airport, you will first have to take a bus at the airport bus station up to <u>Charleroi-Sud railway station</u>. Then, you can take a direct train to Mons (at least two trains per hour; destinations Mons, Tournai or Lille-Flandres). The whole journey time is about 1h30. A bus-train combined ticket can be bought on the machines outside the airport terminal.

By train

Mons is directly connected by train with many major Belgian cities such as Brussels, Namur, Charleroi, Liège or Leuven (but not with Antwerp, Ghent or Bruges; from these cities, we have to go to Brussels first).

From Brussels (no matter from which station: <u>Bruxelles-Nord</u>, <u>Bruxelles-Central</u> or <u>Bruxelles-Midi</u>), at least two trains per hour circulate towards Mons (destination: Braine-le-Comte & Mons, Mons & Quiévrain, or Mons & Quévy). The average journey time is more or less 50~55 minutes.

Outside Belgium, there is also a direct line between the French city of Lille and Mons (from Lille-Flandres station, at least 1 train per hour). The approximate journey time is 1h10.
